JOYFUL CONFIDENCE THROUGH CHRIST'S RESURRECTION

(1 Peter 1:6-9)

Peter wrote early on the subject of joy and the believer because his readers needed the reminder and the encouragement as they faced severe persecution. Later, in 1 Peter 2:12, he exhorted them, "Keep your behavior excellent among the Gentiles, so that in the thing in which they slander you as evildoers, they may because of your good deeds, as they observe them, glorify God." The clear implication is that though the recipients of this letter were suffering unjustly, they should expect such mistreatment and endure it with joy and patience (cf. 1 Peter 2:18-21; 3:9, 14-15, 17; 4:1, 12, 14, 16, 19; 5:10).

In light of the blessedness of salvation, no earthly difficulties should have diminished their joy (cf. Hab. 3:17-18; Matt. 5:11-12; James 1:2). Salvation joy is not some brief, shallow, circumstantial emotion, but rather something permanent and profound (Rom. 5:11; 14:17; Gal. 5:22; Phil. 1:25; 4:4; cf. 1 Chron. 16:27; 29:17; Ezra 3:12; Neh. 8:10; Job 8:19; Ps. 5:11), tied closely to the spiritual Blessings of faith, hope, and love (cf. Rom. 5:2; 12:12; 15:13; Heb. 12:2) and given by God through His Son and the Holy Spirit (Luke 2:10-11, 29-32, 38; 24:52; John 15:11; 16:22; 17:13; 1 Thess. 1:6; cf. John 10:10; 14:26-27; 16:33). Mere happiness comes from positive external events, but salvation joy results from the deep-rooted confidence that one possesses eternal life from the living God through the death and resurrection of Christ (cf. Phil. 3:7-11; Heb. 6:19-20; 10:19-22; 1 John 5:13-14), which joy will be fully realized in the glory of heaven. Peter highlights the reality that joyful confidence through Christ's Resurrection derived from the following truths:

1.	A Protected last," or "Enjoy it while y last." In this you greatly rejoice," (1:6a) "Enjoy it while i last," or "Enjoy it while y last."		
2.	A Proven (vv. 6b-7a) "even though now for a little while, if necessary, you have been distressed by various trials, so that the proof of your faith, being more precious than gold which is perishable, even though tested by fire," (1 Pet. 1:6b-7a) Trials are:

To the Elect of God in Christ, confident joy is not some brief, shallow, circumstantial emotion, but rather something permanent and profound, tied closely to the spiritual blessings of faith, hope, and love and given by God through His Son and the Holy Spirit. "You should be able to figure it out."
