WALK IN LOVE!

(*Ephesians 5:1-2*)

Being loved by God in Christ is the motivation and ground of becoming a loving person. Understanding the depth of God's love for us in Christ is the key to growing into a loving disciple of Christ. That is the central message of Ephesians 5:1-2. As the apostle Paul concludes his practical instructions on living out our new life in Christ, he gives us two more positive exhortations concerning the radical kind of love that must characterize the life of every Christian.

1.	Be as His beloved children.
	As Paul sums up his practical exhortation, he concludes by restating the ultimate goal
	of the Christian life – to be like God. In the words of Paul, "Therefore, be imitators of
	God" (Eph. 5:1). The term for imitate means to mimic or to copy the characteristics of
	another person. Paul is teaching us the truth that the whole aim of our Christian life and
	ethics is to reproduce in us the very characters of God Himself (Eph. 4:25-32; 1 Pet.
	1:15-16). The underlying reason and motivation behind our imitation of God is the
	glorious truth that we are God's beloved children (1 John 3:1). It is our greatest
	privilege and delight then to aim and conform our character after God our Father.
2.	Walk in love as
	In Ephesians 5:2, Paul specifies how we must imitate God by urging us to "walk in
	love as Christ has loved us." To imitate God is ultimately to imitate Christ in the way
	He loves us. This is foundational to our motivation in loving others. We could only
	love others when we truly grasp and understand how much we are deeply loved by God
	in Christ. In other words, we love others from the reservoir of God's love for us in
	Christ. Paul describes the glorious manner by which our Lord Jesus has loved us when
	he said, "Christ also has loved us and given Himself for us, an offering and a sacrifice
	to God for a sweet-smelling aroma" (Eph. 5:2). Christ's love for us is self-giving (John
	10:17-18; Phil. 2:8; John 15:13); substitutionary (Isa. 53:5-6; 2 Cor. 5:21; Rom. 5:8);
	sacrificial (Heb. 10:11-14; 1 John 4:10) and satisfying (John 19:30; Heb. 10:14). By
	way of application, we walk in Christlike love when we commit to love others for the
	glory of God, when we commit to love our fellow believers as Christ loves His church,
	and when we commit to love the lost by sharing the gospel of Christ to them.
